For the purpose of this Directive: **Article 1(b) natural habitats** are areas
terrestrial or aquatic distinct from caratteristische geographical, abiotic or
biotic, entirely natural or semi-natural.

On this map published by the CEE/ETC/BD in 2011 we see in pink all the 6
alpine habitat types (off map Scandinavia) where the territory of the
Traditional Alps is again the same as it was indicated by the ancient Romans.

It is usually the name of the inhabitants, such as Lepontini, Reti, Apuani, or
Carni or also the same name for them incompreensible but used by aboriginals
like Monterosa, Similaun, Ortles as it is incompreensible for them the word **Alp**
sometime renamed Alpes, Alpīs, Alpium. Names preserved today for instance
in the group of Monviso renamed after Cottius the roman governor, from wich
the Alpes Cottiae, while the Rhaetian Alps are named after Retus who led the
Cisalpinos to the Alps on the resistance against the barbarian immigrants.

Many years later, ruling Charlemagne during the Middle Ages, the intrusions
of the barbarians (who are not montagnard) renamed our mountains after
the valleys they raided, plundered and set on fire, and also with the name
of woods and forests or rivers bordering the pastures used by aboriginals:
only them, no alpine montagnard would ever call an alp, or his mountain,
after the stream or anything that dwells on the floor downvalley.

As a result, all politically correct maps or "institutions" that perform in many
ways the devious substitution, or even ethnic cleansing of aboriginal people,
pursue the same aggressive invasion of Middle Ages, that will not end until
these borders will be fully demilitarized and chased out from **our Alps**.
